Where to report storm damages

People affected by wind storms and flooding that hit Washington this week should report storm damages to:

- Their insurance company (if they have one).
- Their county's emergency management agency.

The following counties are already collecting damage information from homeowners and small business owners. They have established the telephone phone numbers and web sites listed below for that purpose. This information will be updated as other counties are ready to accept damage reports.

Individuals should be prepared to provide the following information:

- Name and address of affected property.
- A description of damage, even if it is insured.
- A personal estimate of *uninsured* losses.
- Estimates of the fair market value of the damaged home or business.

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This preliminary information will be forwarded to the State Emergency Management Division, which will perform a formal damage assessment in partnership with Federal Emergency Management Agency in the coming days. Findings from this formal assessment will be used by the Governor to decide whether to request a disaster declaration and federal disaster assistance from the President. This process could take up to two weeks or more. Federal disaster assistance, if and when it becomes available, only covers uninsured losses.

Individuals and families impacted by storm damage should immediately take the following steps:

- Call your insurance agent to check on your coverage.
- Keep detailed records of all clean-up and repair costs, including photographs.
