Dear Kevin, A suggestion for the next Shorewood Newsletter; the third runway opened on Nov. 20. Since then, the airport noise has significantly altered our way of life in Shorewood, particularly late at night and between 5 and 9 in the morning. To register a complaint, call 433-5393. You will be asked to place your phone number and address on file so that the locations of complaints can be

mapped. Consider it done. Everyone who has noticed the increased air traffic noise should call in and register.

Hi Kevin,

I noticed a lot of airplane noise and a fuel smell in the past few weeks and found out they changed the flight paths and can now fly over our neighborhood more frequently and at lower elevations. You might want to put something about this in the newsletter. I'm going to start attending the monthly meetings that involve the Port of Seattle and this noise issue. I'll keep you posted.

Thanks for going there and representing us. Please don't bring a laser pointer with you to the meetings.

Over-flights and Airport Noise

First, the good news; I have received no complaints of barking dogs from homeowners recently. I know you are all as thankful for that as I am. So either people are now trying harder to control their pets, or they have moved away, or the barking is being drowned out by something else. Experience, and your emails, tells me it is probably more of the latter.

All of us in Shorewood are going to have to report airplane noise events and over-flights if we hope to make ourselves heard by the Port and the FAA. If you notice airplane noise, exhaust, or fuel smell, you should call the SeaTac Airport Noise Information Line at 433-5393 and complain. The more specific the complaint the higher the likelihood your complaint will be heard by someone important enough to do something about it. Reporting the exact time is critical, but knowing which aircraft is offending is important too.

But how can you tell what kind of airplane it is when all you have to go by is those little blinking lights disappearing over the horizon?

World Wide Web to the rescue! Here is a link to the Flight Tracker program so you can go online and see who is making the racket:

<u>http://sea.webtrak-lochard.com/template/index.html</u> You may need to install a viewer from Adobe, but this should be easy. It was a snap on my computer.

When you bring up the site the graphic displayed has about a 10 minute lag, so you are looking at flights from 10 minutes ago instead of the flight currently bearing down on your house. You can also stop motion, change speeds, and rewind to an earlier date if you want to scan flight history over the last three months. Very useful if you hear something in the night. Just remember the time and go back to sleep. You can check flight history in the morning for the aircraft that woke you, then call 433-5393 and let 'em have it.

If you have questions or need help call Kevin at 932-3200, or Marv at 242-5965. If you happen to *like* airplane noise be sure to call 433-5393 and let them know about that too.

Environmental Stewardship Begins Close to Home

Work parties in Shorewood Park continue in 2009 from 10:00 AM to Noon on the 3rd Saturday of every month. Please join us! We have many tasks, great and small! January's volunteer force boasted 11 – some pulled ivy from an area graced by two Noble Fir trees planted by Fred Henzi over 20 years ago. Others planted Coastal Strawberry plants, a wonderful native groundcover. In February volunteers placed 25 Sword Ferns along our trail and then removed many small English Holly trees and lots of English Ivy.

So that nobody feels left out, we also have monthly work parties at Seahurst Park on the 4th Saturday of each month. Since so many of you live closer to Seahurst Park than to Shorewood, you may prefer to work there. So please add these events to your calendar. You might wonder - Why is English Holly a problem? In King County, English holly is classified as a <u>Weed of Concern</u> and its control is recommended in natural areas that are being restored to native vegetation and in protected forest lands.

English holly is carried by birds into forests where it can form dense thickets that dominate the tall shrub layer and suppress germination and growth of native tree and shrub species. It does appear that English holly is encroaching into native forest habitat and reproducing successfully in fairly undisturbed native communities.

In the <u>Seattle Urban Nature Project's</u> plant inventory of Seattle's public forests, English holly was frequently found in the understory. In fact, English holly was the fourth most abundant non-native species found, outnumbered only by Himalayan blackberry, Scotch broom and English ivy. English holly, along with English laurel, was more common in the understory than native conifers. Given their findings, it is likely that English holly, along with other invasive non-natives, will be in a much better position to replace Seattle's aging deciduous trees than our native evergreen trees. Urban Nature ecologist Ella Elman predicts that, if nothing is done, 30 or 40 years from now Seattle's forests will look dramatically different than they do today. *Jean Spohn*
