President's Letter

Happy Fall to y'all. We've had a busy and productive Summer here in the Shorewood on the Sound community.

In June we had our yearly Streets of Garage Sales. This was led once again by Randy and Jennifer Ingersoll's daughter, Heather, and a good and profitable time was had by all. Our streets were filled with happy shoppers.

In July we had our annual SummerFest led by yours truly. Rand and Laurel Fullington were ably assisted by Nate, Patty and others in food acquisition and preparation. Music was by the Shorewood duo of Eric LeBerg and Barrett Knudsen and Maya and Alena, the twin daughters of Bernd Friedrich and Katya Spielberg. Katherine Brecht, granddaughter of Colleen Webster and Al Falco, painted the faces of every child who approached her table, and some adults, too. A children's bouncy toy was enjoyed by a continuous stream of kids. A wonderful group of volunteers helped in setting up and tearing down. It was a beautiful day and I'm guessing about 150 people attended.

We just enjoyed our August Salmon Bake led, as usual, by the wonderful, witty and irrepressible Joe Cail. Joe did most of the cooking, with help from Kevin DeLashmutt and others, and the food was great. Patty Knudsen was in charge of food acquisition and Guy Lawrence just seemed to be everywhere. I spent most of my time eating and talking to people, so I'm sure I missed out on observing a wonderful group of volunteers who helped set up, tear down, clean up and otherwise serve those who attended the festive atmosphere on a beautiful day. We've had some significant cleanup efforts in the neighborhood and on our beach property, and your dues make these efforts possible. One of our beach tables was seriously damaged by July 4th revelers who had no right to be setting off firecrackers on our beach, and certainly not on our tables. The other two tables were just plain worn out. So we brought in a carpenter, Richard Reidt, to repair all three of them. At the same time, Richard repaired our two benches and created three new benches from logs and wood that had been sitting on the beach. In a second phase, Richard repaired the railing on the trail down to the beach. The railing is now solid which will make the trail much safer.

So the above are just some of the examples of how your dues are put to work in your community. If you have not yet paid your dues, please do so. If you can, please volunteer to help. We have a list of volunteers and we consult it regularly. Neighborhood Block Watch

- 1. Do you have a reason to expect being comfortable and safe in your home or neighborhood?
- 2. Do you have any concerns regarding crime, car prowls, home invasions, security, and theft of items?
- 3. Does your neighborhood have a plan when the next "Big One" hits?
- 4. Can you and your neighbors survive for three to five days without any governmental or societal support of any kind?

The Shorewood on the Sound Community Club is reorganizing the Community Block Watch Program for the Shorewood on the Sound Community Club. In 1993 there were 21 active Block Watches within the Shorewood Community Club boundary. In 2013, there are three active Block Watches within the Shorewood on the Sound Community Club boundary. And, we are not sure if two of them are really within the club boundary.

The Block Watch program is designed to help neighbors work together to protect their neighborhoods and it works because neighbors care enough to be neighbors. They look out for each other. The Block Watch is also the Disaster Preparedness Group for your neighborhood.

At each of our community events, we display a community map which has push pins to place on your property denoting interest in the Block Watch program and if you would be willing to be a Captain of your neighborhood. The Captain merely gets everyone together at least once a year so that everyone can be neighbors once again.
